### Pastor's Note

My annual report called the people of Prince of Peace to connect more deeply with God and one another. My perspective as a newcomer is that all the pieces for faithful ministry are on the table at Prince of Peace, but that common thread that unites, supports, and inspires our mission is lacking. In my report I proposed building on three conversations that came out of "Dinners With Pastor" in the fall: prayer, testimony, and Bernt Midland (you'll need to read my report to understand this one) to help us connect.

So how do we move from conversation to implementation? In other words, how do we connect in Christ within the daily rhythms of Prince of Peace?

Though Lent doesn't begin until March this year, March 5 to be exact, we can start working on our connections now in February.

This Lent let us connect in Prayer.

I am starting a prayer chain. This is very simple. When a specific prayer is requested the request is passed down the chain (via phone, text, email, or personal visit,) until all on the chain have been made aware. Members on the chain simply contact the person linked with them until all are praying for the specific request. Instructions on signing up will be in the bulletin soon. Remember, a praying congregation is a healthy congregation.

This Lent let us connect through testimony.

Testimony simply means telling our faith story. As I wrote in my report, Lutherans struggle with this as we prefer to keep faith private. Yet, when we tell our story we inspire others and the church is strengthened. Lenten midweek worship is an opportunity to tell your story. We all have our faith stories, I heard many of them at "Dinner With Pastor." Consider sharing yours during our midweek service.

This Lent let us connect through Wonderful Wednesdays.

Wonderful Wednesdays truly are wonderful, but I've been told that during Lent soup suppers are held separately from the community meal with our children. How can we connect if we don't eat together? This year let's eat together during Lent. This is how we get to learn the names of our children. Maybe we could even worship together as we hear some of Prince of Peace's faith stories.

Is it liturgically proper to be excited about Lent? I'm not sure, but writing this article has me excited. I look forward to these coming days as we seek to grow in our connections at Prince of Peace.

## Reponse to Budget Review Meeting

On behalf of Council, I want to thank the disciples of Prince of Peace for their outpouring of support following the informal budget review meeting held on January 12. Our congregation is facing a challenge, as people of faith have been doing for thousands of years. Your collective response to this call made it clear that PoP disciples are facing it together. Many people wrote individual comments and offers of prayer in addition to their additional financial support. In all, the disciples at the meeting committed to contribute \$45,000 above their original pledge. This powerful show of support ensures that our ministries will continue to thrive.

This response from disciples, both financially and spiritually, changed the dynamic of our last Council meeting. The initial discouragement many of us felt during the December meeting was replaced with a sense of faith and optimism. Council members were also committed to ensure the budget to be presented on January 26 reflects a faithful stewardship of our resources in support of God's mission here at Prince of Peace. Our discussion included ways to increase our presence in the community as well as ways to control expenses.

The budget presented to the congregation on January 26 will still have a deficit for 2014. Our collective work is not over. But the deficit is now at a level which we can navigate, with thoughtful stewardship, faith in future opportunities with renewed confidence in the devotion of PoP disciples.

In the past, I've shared some insight into my life as a music minister, offering quips about all of the different aspects that go into planning services and special music. I haven't talked about this in a while, and I wanted to share again some thoughts and insights.


Since Pastor Froehlke joined us in July last year, many of you may have noticed some slight changes in our worship services. We have started to use the Kyrie as well as a confession/affirmation at the beginning of every service. We have also often included a post-communion canticle. These elements were not in our services on a weekly basis during Pastor Lutz's time at PoP or during the pastoral vacancy. You might also have noticed the Great Thanksgiving being sung instead of simply spoken. And if you pay very close attention you would have noticed that we moved the children's sermon before the Gospel Acclamation instead of after it.

I sometimes get asked about my selections for a given week regarding liturgy, hymn selections, special music, etc. I truly enjoy these conversations. Even with training and wonderful resources, I am only one person, and I thrive on hearing stories and anecdotes from you, telling of cherished hymns, not-so-cherished songs, things you have liked from other congregations, and so on. We are a unique congregation in that we have a very large canon of music, including hymns, liturgical songs, and music in a wide variety of styles. As always, I strive to put much thought into every single service, seeking to include selections that will not only help us enjoy service, but that will challenge us to a deeper and more meaningful faith journey. We have a great wealth of musical talent and affinity at PoP. I so enjoy the weekly task of programming music to help feed our spiritual hunger.

In this New Year, remember that there is always an opportunity for you to be involved in the music ministry. Our ensembles are always open. And, if you can't make it to rehearsals, we can always schedule special music solos or small groups. If you like being involved in music, there's a place for you at PoP!



## Cub Scouts Help Replenish Crisis Ministry Food Pantry

Cub Scout Pack 48 of West Windsor helped replenish the food pantry inventory of the Crisis Ministry of Trenton and Princeton. A two-day food drive on December 14 and 15 raised \$950 plus 288 full grocery bags of nonperishable food for the group from patrons at the McCaffrey's supermarket in West Windsor. That December weekend included the first snowstorm of the season, yet the pack decided to move ahead with the project.

McCaffrey's Store Manager John Staszak and his staff were supportive of the pack's proposal to invite shoppers to purchase donations along with their regular groceries. Twenty-two scouts, age 6 through 11, worked in daytime shifts of 90 minutes at the entrance and exit of the store.

Scouts at the entrance handed out leaflets detailing a list of needed items, as they explained, "We're collecting donations to help the Crisis Ministry. We have a list of food items that are needed. If you get some items while you're shopping, we have a shopping cart stationed after the cash registers to collect the food."

Many shoppers took the list, smiling to see Cub Scouts taking time to help those in need. Some donations were small – a box of macaroni or 50 cents. Others were generous. One man, eager to help the cause, loaded three bags of groceries into the collection cart, then added \$20 into the donation jar. "Keep up the good work," he said.

The boys' faces glowed as they watched the Crisis Ministry van drive up to collect donations on the last day of the drive. Scouts pushed carts brimming with shopping bags, and loaded them into the van. Two-hundred and eighty-eight bags of food later, the van was full. The boys also presented the cash donations of \$950 to Crisis Ministry representative Mark Smith. Crisis Ministry Director Carolyn Biondi thanked Pack 48, noting that their efforts will help the thousands in this area who turn to the Crisis Ministry for help.



## Food Collection

Community service is a core value of scouting; at each meeting Pack 48 repeats the Cub Scout Promise which includes "to do our duty to God and our country, to help other people." Area scouts of all ages volunteer in nature conservation projects as well as Scouting for Food programs.



## Real-life sacrifice

“I love to help the people who need it most. Seeing people who are needy motivates me to help. Amazingly, these aren’t the words of a wealthy or comfortable person but of a teenager who, herself, is among the world’s poorest. Her family lives in a Chilean slum and is assisted by a Christian human-services agency.

When fire broke out near the 16-year-old’s home, leaving 220 already-destitute families homeless, the teenager and her mother donated their own blankets, towels and other supplies to people who’d lost the little they had. Her mother even gave away clothes she’d planned to sell for much-needed household income.

I was humbled to read of this girl and her mom. So often I “have contributed out of [my] abundance”; but this pair, “out of [their] poverty” put in “all [they] had to live on” (Mark 12:44, NRSV).
