Political But Not Partisan

You never know what the prayer request is going to be. I begin every confirmation class asking the class about their prayer concerns. I'm impressed how deeply our youth care for friends, teachers, each other, and the presidency. As I asked for prayers last night, one student wanted prayers to impeach the president.

I was caught off guard. On the one hand I was glad that this student was paying attention to what is going on in Washington. On the other hand, I knew I had to tip toe carefully around this request.

Sara Lilja, director of Lutheran Episcopal Advocacy Ministry (LEAM,) says that the church is to be political, but nonpartisan. I like this, but in our country's supercharged partisan divide, it is hard to get involved with politics without taking, or at least appearing to take, a political side. I have never and I will never use my office to tell the congregation how to vote. But neither will I ignore the issues that politics engage with: issues of peace and justice, concern for the poor, LGBTQIA concerns, welcome of the refugee and stranger, and matters of life and death. You can't read the *Bible* without seeing Jesus' advocacy for 'the least of these.'

My sister worked for a congressman affiliated with a political party that I do not vote for. Yes, there is a political divide in our family. I always look forward, though, to our visits and the opportunity to talk politics. We often don't agree, but we respect each other, and we both want what is best for our country. We just have different means of getting there.

I think the same is true in the church, and I think it is what Pastor Lilja is getting at when she calls the church to be political but nonpartisan. There is no reason to vilify those on the other side; but there is good reason to engage and struggle with these same people over issues we care deeply about. Who knows, we may even learn something.

Oh, and the prayer at confirmation last night? I prayed that our governmental leaders would struggle to do what is right for all Americans, especially 'the least of these' in our country.

The African Americans: Many Rivers to Cross

This award winning PBS documentary hosted by Harvard University scholar Henry Louis Gates Jr. is long but a must-watch. The six-part series covers the history of the African American experience from the colonial era to the Civil Rights Movement and modern day, while going beyond just the facts to provide a range of cultural and social perspectives.

American Promise

American Promise follows two boys navigating the US education system over a span of 13 years. The documentary highlights the persistent educational achievement gap that affects African Americans across all socioeconomic levels.

What is Systemic Racism?

This is an 8-part video series that shows how racism shows up in our lives across institutions and society: Wealth Gap, Employment, Housing Discrimination, Government Surveillance, Incarceration, Drug Arrests, Immigration Arrests, Infant Mortality. Pastor's class has been delving into this question based on the book by biblical scholar Daniel Hawk entitled *The Violence of the Biblical God.*





Easter Groceries for Seniors Served by Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ

Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ (LSM/NJ) has again asked us to partner with them in providing bags of groceries for Easter dinner to residents in some of their housing facilities. This Lent, we will be collecting bags of groceries and individual grocery items for senior citizens who are served by LSM/NJ in Camden. Be on the lookout for the collection table, which will be in the Gathering Area during Lent. The deadline for receipt of the groceries is Sunday, March 29, 2020. They will be delivered on Monday, March 30. We are announcing this ministry early so that you will be able to start planning for it.

This year, the bags are to contain the following items:

Boxed potatoes (au gratin, scalloped, or mashed)

2 cans of vegetables

2 cans of fruit

Mac and cheese

Applesauce in non-breakable containers

Corn bread/muffin mix

Cake mix and frosting

LSM/NJ will be providing the hams for the bags. Monetary donations to be used for the meat purchases would also be gratefully accepted. Please make checks out to Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ and earmark "For Easter Groceries".

Other items, including Easter goodies (candy, napkins, etc) may also be added. In addition to the basics listed above, each of the bags may have different items. Not all of the bags need to be exactly the same.

Thank you for your partnership in this ministry to feed the hungry, especially our sisters and brothers who are senior citizens.

In response to the various speakers and forums at Prince of Peace and nearby churches this fall and winter, many members are feeling frustrated that all talk and no action is not enough of a Christian response to the topics explored. Members were invited to an organizational meeting on anti-racism on Thursday, January 30 to discuss steps our church can take toward correcting the systemic racism in the ELCA and our own congregation as follow-up to our forums on Lenny Duncan's *Dear Church: A Love Letter to the Whitest Denomination in America* and the challenge by our speaker on Refugee Sunday at Dutch Neck to have the hard conversations it takes to not just recognize but change racism and colorism in our own church, community, and country. This year we will be filling and sending around **30 boxes** to students all around the country, and **9 small treat bags** to our local students and our *Senior Valentines*.

Baked goodies are always greatly enjoyed. If you would like to bake some treats, please bring them to church on Sunday, February 2nd. Snacks, school supplies, candy, gum, microwave popcorn are some of the goodies sent in the past. Any yummy treat that fits in a 8 x 12 x 8 box is welcome. We are packing the boxes on Monday night (February 3rd) starting promptly at 7:30 pm.
