Thoughts on Gun Violence

Once again we've heard of a church shooting this past Sunday at the West Freeway Church of Christ near Dallas. While three victims lost their lives, one of them the shooter; the church's security team is being lauded for preventing a much grimmer death toll. One member of this team was armed, ready, and waiting to act upon just what happened. He was a *good guy* with a gun who prevented the *bad guy* with a gun from doing greater harm. Many are hailing the Texas gun laws that allowed this very scenario to play out.

I'm not convinced. I'm not questioning this particular story. I'm grateful it wasn't worse. But we need to view this story from above the fray.

Mass shootings get all the attention. What we don't read about in the news are the daily deaths from guns that surge way above isolated mass shootings. Reba Holly, from *Moms Demand Action For Gun Sense in America*, spoke at St. Bart's back in November when we beat the gun into a garden tool. She noted that gun deaths from suicides, accidents, and homicides are far greater, in percentage, in states like Texas, with its lax gun laws; than in states like New Jersey, with stricter gun laws. It makes sense. Greater access to guns will cause more deaths to gun violence.

On one hand, the West Freeway Church of Christ is to be admired for their security team and quick response to this deadly threat. Still, I hesitate to embrace a system that encourages more guns to keep peace. Maybe it worked last week, but I, for one, feel less secure when this becomes the norm to protect houses of worship.

The Healing Power of Music

As 2019 rolled into 2020, I spent some time reminiscing on the year that has been. Although I find myself and my family relatively healthy and provided for, 2019 proved to be quite difficult. The daily grind was harder this year. Westminster Choir College's situation is more perilous than it has been for more than a generation. And this has weighed heavily on me, as I very much love the school and what it stands for. Although I am hopeful for Westminster in 2020, I am not confident in its future.



Megan and I were blessed, though, to travel some in 2019, seeing some of our favorite places. We got to visit Melody in Maine twice, and we worked our way up and down the coast for a few short weekends with friends and family. And the music ministry at PoP has continued to be fulfilling and sustaining. As I looked back at some of my photographs from 2019, I came across one that was taken on March 24. This was back during Lent, and John Franek was our church

musician. As you all remember, John enjoyed improvising his preludes and postludes, often giving mini-concerts as postludes. On March 24, 2019, I started the postlude as I often do, unplugging the power to the wireless microphones, properly stowing the i-Pad, and turning off the sound system. As I emerged from the sacristy, I saw Stella Angevine at the piano while John was playing. It was as if John sensed what she wanted to hear, as he deftly played through variations on *Amazing Grace*. I don't remember Stella coming over to the piano before, so her presence was powerful,

intentional, and important. It would be the very last worship service at Prince of Peace that Stella would attend before her passing a few weeks later.

When I feel down or worn out, I like to think of how Stella's spirit was uplifted and buoyed with John's gift of music. As one of our professors at Westminster likes to say, 'When medicine cannot cure, music heals.'

The Binding of Isaac January 12th, Education Hour Immediately Following Worship





Transportation Assistance For Refugee Family Needed

The needs of an immigrant family that has been settled in Hamilton has come to the attention of our congregation. *One World, One Love,* an all-volunteer agency that supports refugees and partners with the International Rescue Commission, requests our help in supporting the Win Family.

The Win Family settled in Hamilton about two months ago. They are Muslims who escaped religious persecution in Burma (Myanmar). The family is made up of a father (age 42), mother (age 40), two sons (ages 13 and 11) and a daughter (age 7). They do not have any close family or friends in the area. They landed in Hamilton 'by luck.' The father was a businessman in Burma and speaks six languages. He is very easy to communicate with in English. The children are getting better at their English!

The family seems to be doing all the right things. The children have received their immunizations and are enrolled in school. The father is taking part in a job training program.

At this point in time, their most urgent need is food. Resurrection Lutheran Church has a food pantry which is open on the first and third Wednesdays of the month from 5:30 to 7:30 pm. POP volunteers transported the family to the food pantry during the month of December. We are looking for volunteers for the New Year. The task involves picking the family up at their home, driving them to the church, assisting them in picking out food items, and taking them home. The total time commitment is about two hours.

If you are interested in helping with this effort, please speak with Pastor or Wendy Schutzer.

P.S. It has also been conveyed that the family could use ShopRite gift cards. They are vegetarians and the food pantry does not provide many of the food items that this family needs. Donations of gift cards are also welcome.

Thrivent Donates \$500 Towards Two Projects at Prince Of Peace

Volunteers and Funds are Needed to Complete the Projects

First project: Peace Garden Shed

A few years ago Prince of Peace started the Peace Garden on church property. The garden grows produce for food pantries, soup kitchens, and other organizations who provide meals for the foodinsecure in local communities.

The garden could use a shed to store garden tools and equipment, and bags, a scale, and labels needed to package fresh produce. Storage is now spread between volunteers' car trunks, an unorganized bin near the garden, and at a relatively distant garage. The shed will be near the garden to protect and extend the life of donated tools and make them accessible to all volunteers as needed.

The volunteers will benefit from the convenience but more importantly, the food-insecure in our communities will benefit from the continued production of fresh vegetables we will be able to provide.

Volunteers will design and build a platform on which to construct a shed from a kit which does not include a base.

Second Project: House Next Door Property Enhancement

The House Next Door is an outreach ministry centered in the house on the property next to Prince of Peace. The ministry is dedicated to reaching those who may not necessarily come to traditional worship or belong to a church but would like spiritual direction. In recent years the church has added several gardens (Peace Garden, Butterfly Garden, Memorial Garden) and a labyrinth to this property and welcomes the community at large as well as individuals and organizations to use the facility.

The Spiritual Formation Team would like to make the outdoor areas even more convenient, flexible, and welcoming, and build or purchase more signage, pamphlet holders, and picnic tables to expand and ease the use of these beautiful outdoor areas as part of retreats, workshops and meetings for the public and the congregation.

What Has Thrivent Given Prince of Peace?

Thrivent has sent \$250 seed money for each project, a banner to hang as we work on the projects, T-shirts for volunteers, and miscellaneous project assistance plus a free *facebook* link through thrivent.com for further fundraising.

What's Next?

Now it's time for Prince of Peace members to contribute by volunteering to design/plan/lead the building of the wooden platform for the shed and by volunteering to help build the platform and/or the shed early this spring, and by adding to the seed money to fund the rest of these projects. Now that the new year has started It is time for us to look forward to February!

The Valentine Care Boxes will be here soon

We need lots of help! We need help supplying, packing and shipping the boxes!

As we enjoy the Twelve Days of Christmas and celebrate Epiphany, it is time to look forward to February. A very favorite tradition, for both the senders and receivers, is the filling and shipping of care packages. We fill and send boxes with goodies, supplies, and treats to our young adults who are away at school. Many years ago the boxes were a surprise, but now our students know the box is coming and they are always 'surprised' to see how many goodies we can fit into the 8" x 8" x 12" box. This tradition started many, many years ago with just a few boxes, and last year we sent 28 boxes.

P.S.: We also remember our older Valentine's with a small bag of treats

The care packages contain a variety of goodies from home-made cookies and brownies and other baked goods, to pens, post-its, candy, instant soups, hot chocolate packets, snacks, and many other things that make a student's life more enjoyable. The box of goodies reminds them and their friends that they are in our thoughts and prayers.

The congregation donates the goodies to fill the boxes along with a few dollars to help with the cost of shipping. Shipping last year averaged \$18 per box. Donations may be placed in the offering plate with *Valentine Boxes* noted in the memo section. The goodies are collected at the church for several Sundays in January; the boxes are packed and readied for shipping at the church, then taken to the USPS for shipping. By Valentine's Day our young adults away at school get a special package with lots of love and care from their church family.

So while you are out with your holiday returns and bargain hunting, remember we are soon filling around thirty boxes with treats for those in school and living away from home. So if you find some goodies, pick them up and bring them to the church.

Plan on baking some cookies, supplying some treats, and donating some \$\$s to help fill the boxes with lots of extra love, care, prayers, and goodies!

Boxes will be filled and readied for shipping on Monday, **February 3**, starting at 7:30 pm in the Gathering Area. Plan on coming and helping to fill the boxes. We start promptly.

Boxes to be taken to the post office and UPS on Tuesday, **February 4**.
