### A New Year, A Chance to Act and Advocate, to Acknowledge and Reconcile

Yes, 2021 has been a difficult year, but here at Prince of Peace it's been a year full of learning and progress, and your Racial Justice Team was part of that. Throughout the fall and into the winter, various team members have been networking; attending the course *Transforming White Privilege*, offered by the NJ Synod Anti-Racism Team; and reading, researching, and attending meetings and workshops on various issues and legislation related to the inequities in our communities and institutions.

So what's coming in 2022? Here's just a taste:

- Continued education of members and friends through adult forums, sermons, newsletters, suggested courses and events, and the Racial Justice Lending Library. Note: There are now over fifty books available on the tables in the narthex for you to borrow and read and share with your family at your leisure. Borrow one next time you're in church, or contact Nancy Reyes to have one delivered. Look for an updated spreadsheet showing all that's available soon.
- Use of Synod resources and opportunities related to the Bishop's Challenge. Look for details on each of the following coming in January and February:

Related liturgy and prayers as started during Advent, emphasized during Epiphany Virtual book study led by our Bishop Tracie Bartholomew Movie viewing and discussion between Prince of Peace and local community Trips to little known local sites of

significant Black American historical events as well as rescheduled Synod trip to Jehu Jones sites in Philadelphia

**Opportunities for congregation** members to meet the Bishop's Challenge to begin reparations through Prince of Peace and the New Jersey Synod Adult Forums to continue to raise our understanding of how whiteness and racism are ingrained in Christianity Increased information will be shared to help you advocate for legislation that will work to change systemic racism, whether by signing petitions, calling or writing your legislators, participating in uncomfortable but necessary conversations, attending informative events on inequities in housing or public health, and more.

### World Holidays and Celebrations January 2022

January in the West is typically dominated by the New Year celebration. But there are other cultural and ethnic holidays and observances which occur around the world and have been either brought to this country by immigrants or have significance for them, even if not celebrated here, and many other Americans are often unaware of their observance.

Also, not to be overlooked are the traditional festivals of the First Nations.

Cultural/Ethnic Holidays/Observances				
Date	Holiday	Affiliation	Notes	
Jan or Feb	Hopi Powamu Festival	Native American	The Powamû Festival is a midwinter religious celebration of the Hopi Indians.	
Jan or Feb	Iroquois Midwinter Ceremony	Native American	The Iroquois Midwinter Ceremony is an Iroquois event related to religious traditions and seasonal change.	
1/1 - 3	Shōgatsu	Japanese	The Japanese New Year celebration, falls on the familiar date of January 1 per the Gregorian calendar, but the celebration in Japan is stretched out days before and after. It's considered one of the biggest festivals in Japan. Shogatsu is observed by enjoying many traditional foods that vary between regions in Japan.	
1/6	Three Kings Day (Epiphany)	Christian – Latin American Tradition	The day is called "Día de Reyes" (The Day of Kings, a reference to the Biblical Magi), commemorating the arrival of the Magi to confirm Jesus as son of God. On January 6, a "Rosca de Reyes" (a ring-shaped Epiphany cake) is eaten and all Christmas decorations are traditionally put away.	
1/10	Coming of Age Day	Japanese	Seijin no Hi is a Japanese holiday held annually on the second Monday of January. It is held in order to congratulate and encourage all those who have reached or will reach the age of maturity (20 years old) between April 2 of the previous year and April 1 of the current year, and to help them realize that they have become adults.	
1/13	Korean American Day	Japanese	Korean American Day on January 13 <sup>th</sup> commemorates the arrival of the first Korean immigrants to the United States in 1903. The day also honors the Korean American's immense contributions to every aspect of society.	
1/15 (Observed 1/17)	Martin Luther King Jr. Day	African-American	A federal holiday in the United States marking the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. It is observed on the third Monday of January each year.	
1/26	Republic Day	Indian	A national holiday in India, when the country marks and celebrates the date on which the Constitution of India came into effect on 26, January 1950, replacing the Government of India Act (1935) as the governing document of India and thus, turning the nation into a newly formed republic.	
1/27	International Holocaust Remembrance Day	Jewish	An international memorial day on 27 January that commemorates the victims of the Holocaust, the genocide of European Jews by Nazi Germany between 1941 and 1945. 27 January was chosen to commemorate the date that Auschwitz concentration camp was liberated by the Red Army in 1945.

Happy New Year

Now that the new year has started, it is time for us to look forward to February! The Valentine Care Boxes and Bags will be here soon. We need lots of help! We need help supplying, packing and shipping the boxes!

As we enjoy the twelve days of Christmas and prepare to celebrate Epiphany, it is time to look forward to February. A very favorite tradition for both the senders and receivers at Prince of Peace is the filling and shipping of care packages. We fill and send boxes with goodies, supplies, and treats for our young adults who are away at school. Many years ago the boxes were a surprise, but now our 'college students' know the box is coming and they are always 'surprised' to see how many goodies and surprises we can fit into the 8" x 8" x 12" box. This tradition started many, many years ago with just a few boxes and last year we sent 15 boxes and 12 bags to our 'older student' members.

As we are again in limbo about what we will be allowed to do, we will go ahead with this project.

Last February a small group was able to assemble 15 boxes and 12 bags. So we should be able to do the same this year.

As of now the packing of boxes is scheduled for Monday, February 7<sup>th</sup>, 2022, at the church, with shipping on February 8<sup>th</sup>.


