## Dear Church

Last fall Vicar Erich Kussman from St. Bartholomew's Lutheran Church in Trenton, handed me a book entitled *Dear Church\_with* a subtitle: *A Love Letter From a Black Preacher To The Whitest Denomination In The U.S.*The author of this book is Rev. Lenny Duncan, an ELCA pastor who served a church in Brooklyn and has since taken a call in the Seattle, Washington area.

The whitest denomination Lenny Duncan names is our church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. I've heard this said about our church through the years, but I've dismissed its implications as a geographic reality. The ELCA is strongest in the upper midwest, places like Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa; so we are only reflecting the lack of diversity in this region.

But Lenny Duncan challenges me. He writes:

The reason the ELCA is so white is theological, not sociological. It is not our German, or Scandinavian roots. Black peoples have been a part of the Lutheran tradition on this continent since the 1600s. The face of world Lutheranism is one of color. *Lefse* (a Norwegian flat bread, if you don't know) and hot dishes aren't the problem. But we have abandoned the inherent justice and equity that the gospel is rooted in. We need justice to be the heart of our work and life.

I've heard it said that racism is America's original sin, a sin that we haven't truly confessed of.

In this season of Lent, a season that takes sin seriously, I want to focus on this sin of racism, and take a closer look specifically to our complicity in this sin. I led our adult class on *Dear Church* in November. At the last class some members expressed the desire to continue our discussion and begin the work of addressing some of the points Lenny Duncan raises. The group has met and has named themselves *The POP Social Justice and Anti-Racism Team*.

As a response to this team I believe the season of Lent, liturgically, offers the opportunity to confess of our sins and to open ourselves to the healing and transforming work of the Gospel. You will notice this in our worship and my preaching.

Lenny Duncan resonates with so many of us at Prince of Peace because the book isn't out to bash the ELCA. Notice the subtitle: A Love Letter From a Black Preacher. In his introduction Lenny Duncan says that he met Jesus at an ELCA church, Temple Lutheran Church in Havertown, Pennsylvania. Lenny Duncan experienced radical grace in the ELCA, which led to his ordination in our church. I look at Dear Church, then at Lenny Duncan's response to simply help us practice what we preach.

The first Sunday of March is also the first Sunday of this year's season of Lent. During Lent this year, the music ministry will be focusing on penitent and supportive music. Lent is a season in which we all take very personal journeys of faith amid the safety and support of the entire faith community. So our music selections will focus on the personal journey and community journey ahead of us. We'll be bringing back the sung version of *The Lord's Prayer* during Sundays in Lent. The musical versions of the *Psalms* will also be coming back.

During Wednesdays in Lent, our youth will be back in music rehearsals, learning handbell and choral songs that will be shared in worship on Palm Sunday next month. These rehearsals will end as our Soup Suppers are beginning each week, where we gather together for a simple meal before worshipping together. As in years past, our Wednesday Midweek worship services will be framed by the *Holden Evening Prayer* service. There are sign-up sheets at church for the soup suppers as well as for leaders for the *Holden Evening Prayer* services. All are welcome to attend and participate.

Our thanks to Tim Brown from *Artisans in Wood* for his craftsmanship and for creating this beautiful new addition to our sanctuary.


## Crossroads Sunday, March 1




Called back to Milan, he ends up driving for a German general while spying for the resistance. The book, soon to be made into a motion picture, is based on the true story of a young Italian hero.

## Easter Groceries for Seniors Served by Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ

Again this Lent we are partnering with Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey (LSM/NJ) to provide bags of groceries for Easter dinner to residents in some of their housing facilities. This year, the groceries we gather will go to senior citizens in Camden.

The collection table is in the Gathering Area, along with bags you may use (or you may use your own) and fliers giving the details about the food collection. **The deadline for receipt of the groceries is Sunday, March 29.**. They will be delivered on Monday, March 30. We hope to have at least 25 bags, but LSM/NJ will be grateful for as many as we can provide.

The bags are to contain the following items:

Boxed potatoes
(au gratin, scalloped, or mashed)
2 cans of vegetables
2 cans of fruit
Mac and cheese
Applesauce in non-breakable containers
Corn bread/muffin mix
Cake mix and frosting

LSM/NJ will be providing the hams for the bags. Monetary donations to be used for the meat purchases will also be gratefully accepted. Please make checks out to Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ and earmark For Easter Groceries. Checks may be placed in the offering plate or given to Berta Schott. They will also be delivered to LSM/NJ on March 30.

Other items, including Easter goodies (candy, napkins, etc) may also be added. In addition to the basics listed above, each of the bags may have different items. Not all of the bags need to be exactly the same. If you are not able to provide a full bag, partial bags or individual items are also welcome.

## Prince of Peace is Working Against Racism

After a series of forums last fall based on the book, Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S. by ELCA pastor Lenny Duncan, members of Prince of Peace started organizing and met twice in February to change the systemic racism uncovered in this book. As you can imagine, this is quite a challenge, one that started centuries ago. With the end of slavery in America in the 19th Century and the end of institutionalized segregation through the Civil Rights Movement of the 20th Century, many of the most overt racist laws and practices were changed. Annually, schools and communities sponsor educational events every Black History Month, but are you aware that the ELCA, just like many other organized groups in America, is still perpetuating racism? It's true!

This shocking, disturbing reality was made clear in this book and our forums. Hate crimes and attitudes in daily news have made it obvious that there are many individuals in the US who still don't believe everyone is created equal, but could Lutherans be a part of those wrongs? We as Christians know that racism is a sin, so Prince of Peace is following Christ's subversive example and stepping up to the challenge of fighting to change internalized and systemic racism to make sure our church family is welcoming to all races and cultures.

What will that involve? That's a question interested members have been discussing for the past few months. There are no easy answers since this racism grew from both social and historical constructs, so we are looking for guidance and support from individuals (our own members, visitors, and outsiders with the same concerns), the ELCA, other congregations and religious leaders, local and national organizations, and more.

We have some ideas that are fairly easy to implement:

- add books and toys to our children's worship bags and the nursery that reflect diversity *look* for a wish list of items you might donate soon!
- make sure artwork, our website, and advertising reflects and invites diversity
- include more prayers for victims of racial crimes and oppressed groups
- reconsider white hooded acolyte robes that symbolize past oppression to people of color
- create more visible road signs reflecting diversity for passersby

- include more diverse music, language, and litany in our worship services and events so anyone who walks through our doors will be able to feel comfortable
- sponsor educational events such as a prejudice-reduction workshop and much more — some simple and others much more complex and long-term.

Interested in joining the cause? Join us at 7 pm on Tuesday, March 3 as we continue strategizing and/or Tuesday, March 24 when Rev. Kimberly Vaughn, assistant to the bishop of NJ Synod, will attend to offer guidance in planning POP's attack on racism. Monthly updates will be included in this newsletter to keep the congregation informed and involved. ### A Sampling of Black History Month/Women's History Month Events

On Thursday, March 5, from 5 to 6 the authors of *The Toni Morrison Book Club* will be at Labyrinth Books. The four authors, all professors who met periodically as friends to discuss how Toni Morrison's work captured the black experience in America, reflected on four of her novels and 'disclosed often difficult secrets about their own experiences around issues of race, prejudice, and identity: publishing this book to shed light on all the work there is left to do (Gay, Roxane. 'Secrets.' *TCNJ Magazine*, Winter 2020, 22). They also recorded a podcast of the interview for that magazine which you can hear at tcnj.edu/ Morrisonpodcast.

Ongoing exhibit through April 19: If These Quilts Could Talk at Trenton City Museum, 299 Parkside Avenue, Trenton. An array of quilting styles and color schemes fills first floor galleries with African American artistry, creativity, and storytelling. The Friendly Quilters of Bucks County and Princeton Sankofa Stitchers of Modern Quilt Guild keep the traditions of quilt-making alive with works of art that tell stories and strengthen historical and community bonds.

How much Prince of Peace Care was shipped? 155.8 pounds in 21 boxes within the USA — 1 Valentine treat bag to our local college student; 2 Special Valentine Cards — 6 treat bags — And signed Valentine cards to our Senior Valentines

The Parish Care Team would like to thank all the members and friends of Prince of Peace for their generous support of the Valentine Care boxes project. All of your goodies and dollars have filled 21 boxes, 7 Valentine Bags and two special cards to the brim — sending much love and care to our students away at school and our Senior Valentines. When the package arrives via the USPS or personal delivery, our young adults and seniors are reminded that they are a part of our church family — even though they are not here with us weekly — and their friends get to see what it is like to have a church family.

Some of the things filling the boxes that were shipped on February 3rd were home-baked cookies, instant oatmeal packets, lots of different snacks and treats, pens, pencils, gum, hot chocolate, tea, popcorn, a sponge, a couple of baggies of candy (just to mention a few items) along with a Valentine card. They were shipped to New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Connecticut, Ohio, and North Carolina from the Windsor post office on Tuesday morning. Most were delivered by Friday.

Your donations of dollars, treats, and goodies allowed us to make sure the boxes were overflowing with treats and shipped. We had eleven folks working on Monday night, figuring out how to get all the goodies in the boxes (about 7.5 pounds/box), taping them shut and making sure they all had addresses.

Every year we worry about having enough homebaked goodies to fill all of the boxes. This year we had several bakers! To Our Bakers: Many thanks for sharing your baking skills. And many thanks to those who donated snacks, goodies, and dollars.

Along with the boxes for the students, we filled 7 goodie bags for our Senior Valentines. They enjoy the treats, and most of all the visit when they are delivered.
