# Focusing on God

Dear Church,

March brings upon us a milestone none of us ever wanted. It is in this Lenten season and during this specific month that we will reach one year of COVID-19 in our communities. In many respects, it feels like only yesterday that we began this journey, and, on the other hand, pre-pandemic life feels like it was at least several years ago. For however long this time has felt, it certainly never seemed to give signs that Lent 2020 had ever ended.

Pastor Peter has encouraged us not to write off 2020. Lent 2021 should be added to this sentiment. It's tempting to equate Lent solely with fasting from the things that distract us away from God. To be sure, there is sound and good reason to do so, but perhaps this year when we've already been forced to fast from so many things, we focus less on our actions and more so on God's. Wherever you might find yourself in this season, you don't need to do it alone. Join us in one of our many Lenten offerings. Trust that Christ meets you there and that your family in Christ – this community of believers -- wants to hear you and know your heart. Together, with the variety of gifts and life experiences, we can tell the stories of how God's redeeming work is already at play within our hearts and within our communities.

This eyewitness history is as relevant today as when it was written.




# Reading with Patrick: A Teacher, a Student, and a Life-Changing Friendship by Michelle Kuo (2008)

This memoir by Harvard grad Michelle Kuo takes the reader through her time in Helene, Arkansas, as a *Teach for America* volunteer convinced that as a Taiwanese-American she can relate and make a difference in the lives of her students living under Jim Crow laws. After two years, she gives in to pressure from her



living under Jim Crow laws. After two years, she gives in to pressure from her immigrant parents to attend law school but then returns when one of her gifted students is jailed for murder. Reading the classic poetry and writing of Black authors and activists helps their relationship grow.

# *The Bluest Eye* by Toni Morrison (1970)



This is the African American author and Pulitzer and Nobel Prize winner's first novel, which tells the story of Pecola, a young African-American girl growing up in Morrison's hometown, Lorain, Ohio in 1941, just after the Great Depression. Considered ugly because of her dark skin and mannerisms, her inferiority complex turns into a deep desire for the blue eyes

she equates with 'whiteness.' This intense read has been on some banned books lists because of the incest, child molestation, and other controversial topics addressed as it illustrates the consequences of racism.

> You Can't Touch My Hair: And Other Things I Still Have to Explain by Phoebe Robinson (2016)

A hilarious collection about race, gender, and pop culture from stand-up comedian and podcaster Phoebe Robinson. She describes her everyday experiences as a black woman in America while teaching about racism, microaggressions, and more in a lighter way than most anti-racism books.

# Easter Meal Gift Cards and Greeting Cards For LSM/NJ Families

Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey (LSM/NJ) has once again asked us to help provide the means for Easter Meals for their families and seniors who are in affordable housing. In past years, we've been able to gather bags of groceries and deliver them to LSM/NJ for distribution. This year, however, as with so many other activities, a creative way to do this has been devised by LSM/NJ. They write,

> We will be supporting our families and seniors in affordable housing with meals for the Easter Holiday. Unfortunately, the majority of our properties remain closed to visitors, so we cannot receive Easter Dinner bags as we have in the past. I am suggesting congregations collect grocery store gift cards (Food stores, Walmart or Target). Families will then purchase what works best for them. If your congregation would like to provide something personal – cards would [also] be very welcome. The cards can be homemade or store bought.

The Social Outreach Team, in consultation with the pastors and Kathy Nowak, have agreed that this is a wonderful opportunity for the congregation to share our God-given gifts and to support our sisters and brothers throughout the state of New Jersey. ShopRite and Acme are the suggested food stores, as well as Target and Walmart. Easter cards may be either bought or home-made. Home-made cards are an excellent way to include our children in this endeavor, and also could be a fun family activity. As many cards as you would like to contribute will be appreciated. It will be fine to have more greeting cards than gift cards. Either mail the gift cards and/or Easter cards to Kathy Nowak at the church (177 Princeton-Hightstown Road, Princeton Junction, 08550) or put them in a designated box outside the church's white doors (box will be checked daily). Everything needs to be received by March 15, since they'll need to be mailed to LSM/ NJ and the mail is so slow. If you have questions, contact Berta Schott at 609-799-1783, or rschott21@aol.com.

# West Windsor 5000 Families Initiative Ongoing



# News from the Racial Justice Team

February was a short month but lots happened around Racial Justice.

## **Paying Attention**

Unfortunately, anti-semitists, anti-Asian, and other hate groups have been even more active recently. There have been many incidents in New Jersey and across the country. If you see something, say something. In addition to the police, here are several reporting sites:

#### **Team Activities**

February's Racial Justice Team meeting included many topics from members who'd attended various webinars as well as Black History Month events. These are just a few:

• Inequities in our health system include both accessibility issues and frequent unjust treatment for POC (people of color).

• Policing reform recognizes the need for police and the need to develop trust in police by POC. Proper policies, training and supervision, transparency, and accountability are needed within the police as well as community involvement by funding expanded social services that could provide restorative justice programs, especially for youth, instead of unnecessary violence and inappropriate or inequitable incarceration.

#### **Lotus Hill Project**

More of Trenton's history of racism is coming to light in an exciting project started by the rediscovery of Locust Hill, the largest of 21 known colored cemeteries. It includes at least ten Civil War veterans. Various local organizations received grants and are fundraising to develop Assunpink Park with full involvement of the neighborhood. The park will also include a Civil War Veterans Memorial, an amphitheater, a lighted walkway to the creek, environmental research with a minnow pond to restock the creek, sports fields, an area for drill teams and reenactments, replacing abandoned houses with several new single family homes, a museum which will be maintained by the 6th Regiment US Colored Troops. Stay tuned!

## **Getting Educated About Local History**

Princeton has an ongoing history of racism coming more to light as evidence shows from a threatened lynchings if Black students tried to live or eat on campus in earlier times; race riots; and denial of admission, even to Paul Robeson's brother when his father was a respected minister there; and ongoing racist incidents reported personally by the current minister and neighbors of the Witherspoon-Jackson church. Get involved by getting educated about the local history. You and Prince of Peace can help if we start listening.

## **Setting Goals**

The January 6 insurrection brought even more awareness that White Supremacy and Christian Nationalism as well as QAnon and systemic racism are alive and more common than was previously seen. The racial justice team is working to learn more and make a difference. We're considering goals for the coming year, including more work on systemic issues, advocacy, and reparations.

The Parish Care Team would like to thank to all the members and friends of Prince of Peace for their generous support of the Valentine Care boxes project. All of your goodies and dollars have filled 21 boxes, 7 Valentine Bags and two special cards to the brim — sending much love and care to our students away at school and to our Senior Valentines.

When the package arrives via the USPS or personal delivery, our young adults and seniors are reminded that they are a part of our church family — even though they are not here with us weekly — and their friends get to see what it is like to have a church family.

On February 3rd, the boxes were filled with lots of goodies and care. Some of the things filling the boxes were home-baked cookies, instant oatmeal packets, lots of different snacks and treats, pens, pencils, gum, hot chocolate, tea, popcorn, a sponge, a couple of baggies of candy (just to mention a few items) along with a Valentine card. They were shipped to NY, MA, NJ, MD, PA, VA, CT, OH, and NC from the Windsor post office on Tuesday morning. Most were delivered by Friday.

Your donations of dollars, treats, and goodies allowed us to make sure the boxes were overflowing with treats and shipped. We had four folks working on Monday, figuring out how to get all the goodies in the boxes (~7.5 pounds/box), taping them shut, and making sure they all had addresses.

Every year we worry about having enough home-baked goodies to fill all of the boxes — this year we had several bakers! To our bakers: many thanks for sharing your baking skills. And many thanks to those who donated snacks, goodies, and dollars.

Along with the boxes for the students, we filled seven goodie bags for our Senior Valentines. They enjoy the treats and the most of all the visit when they are delivered.
