### Pastor's Page

I am a fan of Jon Stewart and am glad he has returned from retirement to host The Daily Show one night a week. Stewart is known for his comedic take on current events, specifically politics. Not surprisingly, the coming presidential election dominated his commentary on his first night back. He reiterated how many Americans feel that the two likely candidates are not the top choices for either party. In fact, many have circled November 5th, election day, as the beginning of the end of democracy as we know it. But Stewart encouraged his audience to circle November 6th, 7th, 8th and beyond. Any presidential election is important, but the future of the country is not dependent on who wins or who loses, the country will thrive when it's citizens continue to contribute to the greater good regardless of who is president. Stewart encouraged his audience to keep working for America after the election and beyond.

I'm reminded of the book our Field Ed student Sara Manning and I are teaching for our Adult Class this Lent, Refugia Faith. The book is a faithful response to the climate crisis. Debra Rienstra, the author, explains refugia as pockets of safety in nature that allow life to persist after a natural disaster. After the eruption of Mount St. Hellens, Rienstra explained that life returned to mountain much quicker than scientists expected. When the mountain blasted ash and rock across the landscape, refugia sheltered enough of nature to allow life to return with vigor. Nature is resilient. Rienstra advocates for people of faith being refugia in the climate crisis, small pockets of care for the earth amidst great apathy in the general public. Rienstra doesn't minimize the threat of global warming, but neither does she minimize the impact refugia faith can have on saving the planet.



### **Horse by Geraldine Brooks**



Are you concerned about prison and police reform in NJ?

Pastor Erich Kussman and Faith NJ taught POP members several years ago about Mass Incarceration. We know that because of systemic racism, many people of color were unfairly arrested, given longer sentences or imprisoned for nonviolent offenses without chance of parole. Since then your Racial Justice Team has been attending workshops and advocating for programs bringing positive change regarding policing and incarceration. Salvation and Social Justice (SandSJ) is a faith-based organization focusing in three related areas in NJ:

- Are you worried when you hear NJ may be releasing prisoners and expunging their sentences? Those being released are not the violent criminals opponents talk about. To learn more, see SandSJ's first Clean Slate Initiative slide show here: https://www.sandsj.org/csi
- What about older prisoners? Several states have already passed Second Look legislation and more are pending at state and federal levels. Though they vary, the law under consideration in NJ would allow prisoners over 60 who have served at least 20 years or half of their sentence to apply for release. For more general information about Second Look laws see
- On the preventive side, one way of reforming policing has been so successful as a pilot program in Trenton and other areas that it was recently signed into law in NJ, financing its expansion to more communities. Community Crisis Response Teams include professionals to de-escalate mental health crises without involving the police if not necessary. # <u>Sacred Spiral</u> by Aspen Song Kids of Taos Pueblo – donated by Lois Case

We are the Aspen Song Kids from Taos Pueblo, a beautiful place in Northern New Mexico. Our mission is to preserve our culture, our heritage, our tradition, and our language. We do that through our art. We give our thanks to our elders and our ancestors. Our grandparents and great-grandparents were artists. If it were not for their hard work, we would not be here today. We carry on their legacy. We give thanks to the artists who came before. We got our name, Aspen Song Kids, from our great-great grandfather whose name was Aspen Song. We didn't know him in person as he had passed away before we were born, yet we honor him with our name. The paintings and stories in this book were created by us, the Aspen Song Kids. Every day, after school and on the weekends, we walk from the day school to the Pueblo village where we practice our art and practice speaking Tiwa, our native language. We love learning from the elders about the old ways so we may carry on the knowledge to our children and grandchildren in the years to come. We are proud to share our art and to honor Taos Pueblo with this book. -Aspen Song Kids.

# <u>She's Not There: A Life in Two Genders – donated by</u> <u>Reconciling in Christ Team</u>

The bestselling, seminal work of trans literature: a story of love, sex, selfhood, and understanding from Jennifer Finney Boylan. She's Not There was one of the first works to present trans experience from the perspective of a literary novelist, opening a door to new understanding of love, sex, gender, and identity. Boylan inspired readers to ask the same questions she asked herself: What is it that makes us---ourselves? What does it mean to be a man, or a woman? How much could my husband, or wife, change—and still be recognizable as the one I love?

Boylan's humorous, wise voice helped make She's Not There the first bestselling work by a transgender American--and transformed Boylan into a national spokeswoman for LGBTQ people, their families, and the people that love them. "Love will prevail," said Boylan's conservative mother, as she learned about her daughter's identity. She's Not There is the story that helped bring about a world in which that change seems almost possible.

# <u>The Gay Revolution: The Story of the Struggle – donated by Reconciling in Christ Team</u>

The sweeping story of the modern struggle for gay, lesbian, and trans rights--from the 1950s to the present--based on amazing interviews with politicians, military figures, legal activists, and members of the entire LGBT community who face these challenges every day.

The fight for gay, lesbian, and trans civil rights--the years of outrageous injustice, the early battles, the heart-breaking defeats, and the victories beyond the dreams of the gay rights pioneers--is the most important civil rights issue of the present day. Based on rigorous research and more than 150 interviews, The Gay Revolution tells this unfinished story not through dry facts but through dramatic accounts of passionate struggles, with all the sweep, depth, and intricacies only an award-winning activist, scholar, and novelist like Lillian Faderman can evoke.

In the words of the eyewitnesses who were there through the most critical events, The Gay Revolution paints a nuanced portrait of the LGBT civil rights movement. A defining account, this is the most complete and authoritative book of its kind.

# "O SACRED HEAD, NOW WOUNDED"

Imagine that you are in a church, looking up at a large crucifix, the body of Christ on the cross. You hear music, remember some words, and start to notice certain things, like the hands. "Wide open are your hands To pay with more than gold The awful debt of guilt and sin, Forever and of old. Ah, let me grasp those hands, ..." That hymn text by Lutheran pastor and Philadelphia seminary professor Charles Krauth (1823—

83) is part of a long tradition.

There was a big medieval poem about various parts of Christ's body on the cross: the hands, the feet, the side, the heart. The most famous section of that Latin poem, inspired by Bernard of Clairvaux (1090–1153), was about the face or the head. German Lutheran pastor Paul Gerhardt (1604–76) translated the whole text and we sing that part as "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship 351). Gerhardt evoked the grisly sight of blood, spit, and gore, and all for what? "Thy grief and bitter passion were all for sinners' gain; mine, mine was the transgression, but thine the deadly pain." The English translation by Princeton Seminary professor James Alexander (1804–59) cleaned up some of the gruesome sight but retains the power of the Passion.

The ten stanzas have been chopped down to four, but the final one still makes the same point. When Julian of Norwich (1342–1430?) thought she was dying and was reminded to gaze upon a crucifix, she may have experienced what the last stanza gives us too, in Lent 2024:

"Lord, be my consolation; shield me when I must die;

Remind me of thy passion when my last hour draws nigh.

These eyes, new faith receiving, from thee shall never move;

For [she] who dies believing, dies safely in thy love."

The Peace Garden irrigation system needs some updating but the current volunteers don't have the skills needed. The timer we use waters both gardens at the same time, so if one needs a lot when the other doesn't, the first gets flooded and water is wasted.

We also have a faucet that leaks and makes the walkway by the Cherry Tree Garden muddy.

If you have the skills to help separate the system into two separate timers or fine-tune our system, POP will be saving money and our gardeners will be appreciative!
