# Pop-Up POP

Pop-up POP. It sounds like a line from Dr. Seuss.

Actually the line comes from Dr. Doug, our Minister of Music. In a recent staff meeting Doug shared that as we continue to gather in person, and outdoors, the weather becomes more of a hindrance as we move into November. Worship, confirmation, Christian Focus, youth campfires, or really any outdoor gathering is hard to schedule since the weather will be working against us.

Enter *Pop-up POP*. The idea is that when we see a window of favorable weather, probably for the next day or two, we announce a *Pop-up*, via the Prince of Peace email or Facebook page, and see who from POP pops in. This would never work in our usually hyper-scheduled lives, but the pandemic has overturned everything else, so maybe we can now be a bit more spontaneous.

While the Building Use Task Force has made no official announcements about building use for November (our next meeting is past the newsletter deadline), I remain hesitant about opening the building up. The virus still is not under control, and I think we all anticipate further waves.

Yet I cannot overstate the importance of gathering in person. People who attended the outdoor 11:00 service Sunday, October 18, were so excited to be together, as many had not been to church since March. We need to offer as many in-person opportunities as we can. I am thankful for zoom and livestreams, but neither can provide our human need for in person contact.

So watch for *Pop up POP* in November and beyond.

### All Saints Sunday, November 1

#### **Resurrection Tree**

We would also like to give you the opportunity to remember all of your loved ones who have died in the faith by helping us to create a Resurrection Tree. We invite you to make a butterfly with your loved ones' name(s) written on it. Your butterfly can be as simple or as ornate as you like. Be sure to provide a way that your butterfly can be hung from a branch on our tree. Please drop it off in the All Saints' box located outside of Community Hall no later than noon on Saturday, October 31. The Resurrection Tree will be displayed in worship on All Saints' Sunday. After worship, weather permitting, you will find it in the Memorial Garden.

#### Labyrinth Walk

As another way of remembering your loved ones, we invite you to walk the Labyrinth on All Saints' Sunday. The Labyrinth provides a way for us to pray with our feet. You are invited to stand at the entrance to the Labyrinth and set your intention. Perhaps you want to simply name your loved ones, or give thanks for them, or forgive them. You then step into the Labyrinth and let the Holy Spirit do the rest. Trust that the Spirit will guide you. When you get to the center of the Labyrinth, weather permitting, there will be votive candles. You are welcome to light a candle in memory of your loved ones. You are then invited to retrace your steps and walk out of the Labyrinth. Again set your intention. What do you need to let go? To what do you want to hold on? For what or for whom do you want to give thanks?

During the pandemic our ministry continues with worship, prayer circles, racial justice team, educational ministries, the Peace Garden, youth activities, and pastoral care.

Prince of Peace has shared generously throughout this pandemic, as we begin our stewardship emphasis we ask for that spirit of generosity to continue.

Every Sunday in November the congregation will hear impact stories from our people who see the difference Prince of Peace makes in their lives. Also, during this emphasis you will be receiving mailings and bulletin inserts highlighting our ministries in the name of Christ.

### **Social Outreach Opportunities**

COVID-19 continues to affect our approaches to various ministries and the Social Outreach Team is still working on creative ways to provide outreach opportunities.

Currently, we are still supporting the Food and Clothing Pantries at St. Bart's. They can use bedding and small household items, as well, and are also in need of paper or plastic bags for distributing the food and clothing. **They are also in need of new, or clean used sleeping bags** to distribute as the weather gets colder. Their circle of recipients is still expanding and all donations are greatly appreciated. Bins for these donations are located outside the white doors that lead into the Education Wing. You may also leave donations in sturdy garbage bags there.

Prince of Peace has been and continues to be most generous in supporting St. Bart's and we thank each of you for your part in that effort. Monetary gifts in the form of checks may be made out to Prince of Peace and earmarked for St. Bart's.

The Peace Garden growth has, understandably slowed down considerably, but there are still a few types of vegetables and herbs available, at least for another week or so. Over 650 pounds have been gathered, bagged, and given to several food pantries, most of it going to St. Bart's. Thanks to all of the volunteers who have been working in the Garden.

LSM/NJ has not yet finalized the details on providing specific Christmas gifts requested by individual children in their care, so more information on this endeavor will be sent out to the congregation when the specifics have been finalized.

# **Racial Justice Team Update**

### By the time October ended, had you ...

- Attended the very worthwhile free course *Examining Racism: Looking Inward* with thirteen adults from Prince of Peace? (Sincere thanks to our leaders from Not in Our Town Princeton and the Jewish Center).
- Joined the Parent Conversation on Race? (If not, email for the agenda with lots of online resources for all ages. Suggestions for different themes for such talks are also welcome.
- Supported an area organization or leader working to improve the lives of those affected so disproportionately by the pandemic like POC (People of Color), those incarcerated (many of them unfairly because of their race) and senior citizens in residential care?
- Planned for your youth to talk about race with Sara and Pastor Froehlke?
- Researched and contacted your representatives about the *Dream and Promise Act of 2019, HR6* to help Dreamers and other immigrants living here legally for decades?
- Educated yourself on candidates to see who would work toward a more equitable society in your local community, state and nation?
- Looked into the public questions to understand implicit racism behind several of them?
- Reviewed steps provided in Prince of Peace bulletins to help clarify any confusion and vote? (There's still time if you haven't voted.)

These are just a few things the Racial Justice Team did or discussed this past month.

### And Now for November

- Did you know that to help protect those still incarcerated or working in prisons from Covid19 and to address the disproportionate incarceration of POC, thousands of NJ prisoners (within limited types of crimes) with less than a year left on their sentences are being released on bail on November 4? Our Christian responsibility is to help those in need, and many returnees will not have a place to live, a job, or a support system. If you have any contacts with affordable housing or know of anyone affected by this release, please contact Nancy Reyes so Prince of Peace can consider how to help as a step in reparations.
- Though many received help from stimulus packages, many POC have been excluded so are in danger of losing their home or business. If you know of any nearby, let us know.
- The NJ Synod Anti-Racism Team is holding a virtual Conversation on racial justice, equity and inclusion on Saturday, November 7 from 10:00 am noon.

At the next Racial Justice Team Meeting we will discuss our findings regarding the racial history of our area. We know West Windsor was inhabited by Delaware and Lenni Lenape tribes and have made inquiries regarding the history of other minorities as well. Let's learn together.
