Dear Prince of Peace,

For those eager to get rid of 2020, the start of 2021 has not been encouraging. January 6, 2021 will be another one of 'those' days seared into our memory.

In later years my dad had a tendency to repeat stories. One came from a respected member of his congregation named Ollie Thompson. Ollie once said, 'I may not like what is happening, but it sure is interesting.' I am still trying to figure out if these days are interesting or distressing. Maybe the comic strip character Pogo is more appropriate to quote in these days: 'We have met the enemy, and the enemy is us.'

The mob attacking the United States Capitol yesterday were not the Russians, they were not ISIS, the Iranians, or even immigrants crossing our southern border. The mob looked an awful lot like me.

In case we didn't see it in 2020, these first days of 2021 are revealing our true nature. I saw more than one Confederate flag in the crowd yesterday. Prince of Peace has done a lot of work this past year owning up to our racist past. Yesterday confirmed that those who stormed the capitol and their supporters have no intention of owning a racist past, let alone working for restorative justice. They seemed quite content to fly the Confederate flag.

But another flag I saw was as distressing. All it said in big, bold letters was *JESUS*. Remember what I said about the enemy being us? Some might want to say that the United States is a Christian nation. In some perverted way we are told to believe that Jesus is on our side and not on the other. This might fit neatly into nationalistic religion but it doesn't reflect the Jesus of our sacred text. Remember, *love your enemies?*

Perhaps it is not a coincidence that one of the darkest days of United States history occurred on the Feast of Epiphany. Maybe the guy with the *JESUS* flag should read the story and find out that the ones bearing gifts for the Christ child were not three white guys but foreigners from the east, probably Persia, which is modern day Iran.

Who again is the enemy?

Epiphany means revelation. It was the star that revealed the Christ child born King of the Jews. King Herod was none too happy at this truth. Keep reading the story and find out what happens when kings don't like the truth. It isn't pretty.

If we're serious about to whom the Epiphany star points, then this January 6th revealed not only the truth of who we are as a nation, a truth that Jesus condemns, but also the truth that Jesus is the one to move this country beyond our original sin of racism, where finally we might be able to live what we pledge, *with liberty and justice for all*.

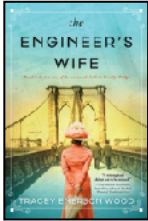

The Engineer's Wife by Tracey Wood



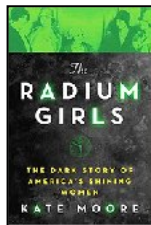

In the 1920's and 30's young women, some only 14 or 15 years old, were hired to paint radium paint onto watch dials to make them glow in the dark. They were encouraged to twirl their brushes in their mouths in order to bring them to a fine point. The young women assumed there was no danger to their health, but the opposite was true as they were poisoned by the jobs they felt lucky to have. This is their story. Eventually publicity stemming from lawsuits filed by some of the victims led to set improved worker safety.

Parish Care — January 2021

Happy New Year!

*Now that the new year has started, it is time for us to look forward to our February projects
The Valentine Care Boxes will be here soon. We need lots of help!*

A 'very favorite tradition,' for both the senders and receivers, at Prince of Peace is the filling and shipping of care packages for Valentine's Day. We fill and send boxes with goodies, supplies, and treats to our young adults who are away at school and, for the last several years, to our 'Senior students.' Many years ago the boxes were a surprise, but now our 'college students' know the box is coming and they are always 'surprised' to see how many goodies and surprises we can fit into the 8" x 8" x 12" box.

This tradition started many, many years ago with just a few boxes and last year we sent 28 boxes. We include our Senior students in this project by delivering a gift bag filled with goodies.

We will be packing boxes and bags on Monday, February 8th at 1:30 pm. I can have a total of six (6) folks in the space to pack boxes. Boxes will be socially spaced out on tables, masks worn, windows open. If you would like to help with the packing please let me know ASAP.

There are several ways that we can all help with this project.

1. We need to know how many boxes we will be sending. I need to know ASAP (no later than January 20th) if you have a student or senior that you would like to receive a box/bag. I need name, current USPS address, if they are living at home learning remotely, living on campus and learning remotely or just away learning. For our students that are living at home we can deliver box instead of shipping.
2. Monetary Donations to help cover the cost of shipping. Last year it was ~\$16/box to ship. Last year we shipped 28 boxes. Checks may be sent to church with offering with a note on check for Valentine Box
3. Gathering donations to fill the boxes. Perhaps this year the easiest way is to gather monetary donations and we will purchase the snacks and goodies for the boxes. If you prefer to purchase items for the boxes, we can make arrangements to have items brought to the church — perhaps leave items in the marked storage

bins outside the church white doors.

Donations need to be at the church by Thursday February 4th

4. **Baked Goodies** – These have always been an important part of our project. If you are willing to bake a batch or two of cookies, brownies, a sweet treat please let me know ASAP. We can make arrangements to get the treats to church for the boxes. Thank you in advance for sharing your baking skills. Baked goods will need to be at church by Monday morning February 8th.
5. Packing and Shipping will be on Monday February 8th, beginning at 1:30 pm. Only 6 people are allowed to be in the building to help. The plan is to finish packing in time to get the boxes to the post office late afternoon.
6. Delivery of Senior student goodie bags. If you would like to deliver a bag or two let me know.

The care packages contain a variety of goodies from home-made cookies and brownies and other baked goodies, pens, post-its, candy, instant soups, hot chocolate packets, snacks, and many other things that make a student's life more enjoyable. The box of goodies reminds them and their friends that they are in our thoughts and prayers.

The congregation donates the goodies to fill the boxes along with a few dollars to help with the cost of shipping (may be placed in the offering plate with valentine boxes noted in the memo section). The goodies are collected at the church through out January, the boxes are packed and readied for shipping at the church, and taken to the USPS for shipping. Then by Valentine's Day our young adults away at school get a special package with lots of love and care from their church family.

So plan on baking some cookies, supplying some treats and donating some \$\$\$s to help fill the boxes with lots of extra love, care, prayers, and goodies!

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A New Year but Racial Justice Needs Continue

Just a year old, the Racial Justice Team ended the year making plans to continue this work, but never expected that within the first week of January, white privilege would be so obvious in the way the attack on our Capitol was handled as compared to racial justice protests in 2020. We're learning to look at all parts of our lives with a Racial Justice perspective and hope you are, too!

At our meeting in December, the committee continued adult forum discussions started earlier in the fall, looking further into our local history. We've found out that several indigenous groups are still here but their land on which we now live and worship as well as promised rights have been taken from them. We've seen that though slavery legally ended, post-slavery laws continue to oppress Blacks in our own communities, just in more subtle ways that are harder to see and to fight. Our discussions have focused on how we've been complicit and so should repair damage done to indigenous and Black Americans through reparations.

Even if you didn't participate in *Examining Racism*, the next few months bring many opportunities to learn more about racism in our country. We pray all members of Prince of Peace will join us on this journey to right the wrongs of racial injustice, and learning is the place to start.

- Pastor Froehlke will be leading *Troubling the Waters* during adult forum time (11 am to noon most Sundays) for the next few months. This is an ELCA curriculum teaching us about white privilege and moving from that understanding to partnering with those who have been oppressed in both overt and more often covert ways and still haven't been recognized as equal since even before the founding of our country.
- The New Jersey Synod Anti-Racism Team is holding another virtual summit inviting Lutherans all over the state to come together virtually on Saturday, January 16 from 10 am to noon to help develop an action plan to fight racism at both congregation and synod levels.
- La Convivencia has adapted its annual recognition of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday with its 2021 Day of Service (individual kits your family can put together to donate on Monday, January 18, scheduling online for drop-off) and a panel discussion at 2 pm that day.
- The Racial Justice Team is one of the sponsors of the movie, *The Long Shadow* (hosted by La

Convivencia, Not in Our Town Princeton and the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Princeton) which you can watch for free on your own schedule between January 17th and 23rd to learn how the director came to realize her own privilege and her family's part in systemic racism. You're also invited to join the virtual Q&A with the director on Wednesday, January 20 at 7 pm.

- See fliers on Facebook page to register for any of the above, and watch for more opportunities as America celebrates Black History Month in February.

With our team's focus on education, we want you to realize that all you'll be learning is American History which includes all the many races, cultures, religions, and beliefs of everyone in this country. That should be yearlong, not just in specific months dedicated to different groups. We have been reading, discussing, attending webinars and interactive meetings studying racism against many races and cultures this year, but ALL of us on the team know there is SO much more to learn. Being antiracist is a continuum and this will be a lifelong process. Most of this was never taught in our schools or families so we need to help each other, such as through a lending library for sharing and trading books coming soon.

Some of our other neighbors have significant holidays in January. The United Nations has designated January 27 as National Holocaust Commemoration Day. On this day in 1945, Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration and death camp, was liberated. We pray that by fighting for racial justice, such events might never happen again.

In India, each state has its own harvest day with many occurring during our winter months. Dance and other performances and festivals characterize each in different ways. Ask your Indian friends and neighbors to share the traditions they may be missing this time of year!
