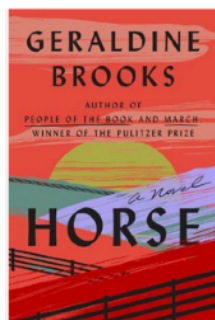

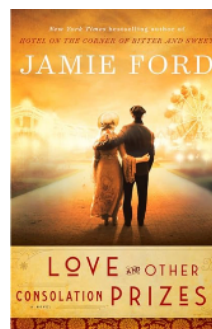
### Horse by Geraldine Brooks

“Horse” by Geraldine Brooks goes back and forth from 1850 to modern-day when art historians discover paintings of Lexington, a beautiful horse considered the greatest race horse of all times.

Research reveals the story of Jarrett, the enslaved black man who trained him and raced him during the Civil War period. In the present day a scientist studies Lexington's skeleton for clues about his speed and endurance. All of this combines into a fascinating mix of art, science, and racial history. Here is another great historical fiction novel by the author of *The Hotel at the Corner of Bitter and Sweet*. The story centers around the Seattle world fairs of 1909 and 1962, two very different eras in the life of the main character, a young Asian-American boy who arrives as an orphan from China and discovers that his benefactor's plan for him at the first fair is not what he imagined. Much of action takes place in a brothel where young Ernest meets two young girls and forms an unbreakable bond. The book was inspired by actual events.

## Racial Justice Team

Always More to Do for Racial Justice - Can YOU help?

As the year comes to a close, your Racial Justice Team continues to educate ourselves and others, looking to see where we can make a difference. Team members have been attending meetings and conferences from various organizations to stay abreast of current needs in surrounding communities...

Princeton Parents for Black Children (PPBC) held their December meeting and holiday celebration in person so families could meet others of color within the school community and their allies including representation from POP. Though this group has been active for several years and the district now has many goals related to equity, those attending this event were encouraging parents and allies to speak up and look into anything their children say that doesn't seem fair. Did you know that some families with children of color move OUT of Princeton to surrounding communities not only because of the cost of living in that town but sometimes because they don't feel welcome OR because there are so few peers or staff of color in their daily classes that their child's self-esteem becomes more of a concern than academics? We all know mental health concerns in America have grown over the past few years, but keep these children in mind when deciding whether to support or use your voice against decisions related to hiring, changing school boundaries, Board of Education seats, or redistricting within the state, not only in Princeton but your own school district and advocate for the marginalized students.

The team has also been discussing how and whether to reach out to the local Spanish-speaking community. Though the numbers seem relatively small, there is a significant population in the area near POP. Do you know anyone this might include? Do you know of a need we could try to address? We're wondering if there is a need for ESL classes, possibly even in our building. If a new Spanish-speaking individual or family walks through our doors, would they feel welcome? We do know of an African American woman who came into our building for a non-POP event, noticed our library and commented that it made her feel more comfortable and welcome. As a result, the team was considering purchasing a few books for the lending library that might do the same for members of the Hispanic community. We decided to ask for donations instead of spending money from our budget at the end of the year, recognizing POP's budget concerns. If you'd like to donate any of the following, please contact Nancy Reyes, team leader, to let her know. Please include whether you will be purchasing the book yourself or sending a check to POP to cover the cost. In consideration of our mission, we try to

buy books from minority owned bookstores or at least through bookshop.com where part of the cost benefits local independent stores (of your choice if you designate one). These are a few ideas we had:

- Bible published in Spanish
- Children's Bible in Spanish
- Luther's Small Catechism in Spanish
- Children's books in Spanish teaching about Hispanic cultures and daily life

Another topic that's been brought up for several years but for which we have not sponsored any programs has been anti-Asian hatred and bigotry. In discussing how to address it, we've decided that ongoing discussions are needed to educate ourselves about the many cultural groups within the Asian community. As we explored ways to speak out and advocate for victims, we realized that this is not a cohesive group. "Asian" includes many nationalities like Japanese, Chinese, Indian, Burmese, Laotian, Vietnamese, Korean, and more as well as multiple religious affiliations such as subgroups. The Prince of Peace Racial Justice Library has some exciting new children's books thanks to the Durie and Cuddahy families. Below are short summaries of each new addition:

**Each Kindness (by Jacqueline Woodson)**

This unforgettable book, with its powerful anti-bullying message and striking art, will resonate with readers long after they've put it down.

Chloe and her friends won't play with the new girl, Maya. Every time Maya tries to join Chloe and her friends, they reject her. Eventually Maya stops coming to school. When Chloe's teacher gives a lesson about how even small acts of kindness can change the world, Chloe is stung by the lost opportunity for friendship, and thinks about how much better it could have been if she'd shown a little kindness toward Maya.

**The Other Side (by Jacqueline Woodson)**

Clover's mom says it isn't safe to cross the fence that segregates their African-American side of town from the white side where Anna lives. But the two girls strike up a friendship, and get around the grown-ups' rules by sitting on top of the fence together.

**The Proudest Blue: A Story of Hijab and Family (by Ibtihaj Muhammad)**

With her new backpack and light-up shoes, Faizah knows the first day of school is going to be special. It's the start of a brand new year and, best of all, it's her older sister Asiya's first day of hijab--a hijab of beautiful blue fabric, like the ocean waving to the sky. But not everyone sees hijab as beautiful, and in the face of hurtful, confusing words, Faizah will find new ways to be strong.

**Tree of Cranes (by Allen Say)**

As a young Japanese boy recovers from a bad chill, his mother busily folds origami paper into delicate silver cranes in preparation for the boy's very first Christmas.

**I Am Every Good Thing (by Derrick Barnes)**

The confident Black narrator of this book is proud of everything that makes him who he is. He's got big plans, and no doubt he'll see them through--as he's creative, adventurous, smart, funny, and a good friend. Sometimes he falls, but he always gets back up. And other times he's afraid, because he's so often misunderstood and called what he is not. So slow

down and really look and listen, when somebody tells you--and shows you--who they are. There are superheroes in our midst!

**Say Something! (by Peter H. Reynolds)**

The world needs your voice. If you have a brilliant idea... say something! If you see an injustice... say something! This empowering new picture book explores the many ways that a single voice can make a difference. Each of us, each and every day, have the chance to say something: with our actions, our words, and our voices. This timely story reminds readers of the undeniable importance and power of their voice.

**I Am Jazz (by Jessica Herthel and Jazz Jennings)**

From the time she was two years old, Jazz knew that she had a girl's brain in a boy's body. She loved pink and dressing up as a mermaid and didn't feel like herself in boys' clothing. This confused her family, until they took her to a doctor who said that Jazz was transgender and that she was born that way. Jazz's story is based on her real-life experience and she tells it in a simple, clear way that will be appreciated by picture book readers, their parents, and teachers. Jazz Jennings has become a spokesperson for trans kids everywhere.

**Sparkle Boy (by Leslea Newman)**

Casey loves to play with his blocks, puzzles, and dump truck, but he also loves things that sparkle, shimmer, and glitter. When his older sister, Jessie, shows off her new shimmery skirt, Casey wants to wear a shimmery skirt too. When Jessie comes home from a party with glittery nails, Casey wants glittery nails too. And when Abuelita visits wearing an armful of sparkly bracelets, Casey gets one to wear, just like Jessie. The adults in Casey's life embrace his interests, but Jessie isn't so sure. Boys aren't supposed to wear sparkly, shimmery, glittery things. Then, when older boys at the library tease Casey for wearing "girl" things, Jessie realizes that Casey has the right to be himself and wear whatever he wants. Why can't both she and Casey love all things shimmery, glittery, and sparkly? Here is a sweet, heartwarming story about acceptance, respect, and the freedom to be yourself in a world where any gender expression should be celebrated. Sparkly things are for everyone to enjoy!

### **Baby's First Book of Banned Books (by Mudpuppy)**

Baby's First Book of Banned Books is a unique new board book from Mudpuppy that introduces beloved classics and cherished stories like The Diary Of Anne Frank and To Kill A Mockingbird to little learners. Provides young children with a captivating and engaging way to learn key lessons from infamous classic banned books. Simple yet bright and bold illustrations with simple yet powerful messages, the book contains a glossary and explanation of each book featured.

#### **Valentine Box and Bag Project**

As we enjoy the 12 days of Christmas and prepare to celebrate Epiphany, it is time to look forward to February. A "very favorite tradition", for both the senders and receivers, at POP is the filling and shipping of care boxes to our young adults away at school and bags of treats for our "Senior students". We fill and send boxes with goodies, supplies and treats to our young adults that are away and deliver bags of treats to our Seniors.

Many years ago the boxes were a surprise, but now our "college students" know the box is coming and they are always "surprised" to see how many goodies and surprises we can fit into the 8" x 8" x 12" box. This tradition started many, many years ago with just a few boxes and last year we sent 7 boxes and 11 bags to our "Older" members.

Save the Dates: The boxes will be packed and shipped/delivered Feb 4 or 5 and 6th, 2024. Depending on building use, number of boxes and bags, and weather the date will be firmed up closer to the ship date. Updates to follow.

Donations are used to purchase items to fill boxes and bags and to ship the boxes. Last year shipping charges were ~\$20/box.

Plan on Baking Treats to include: Please bring to church on Feb. 4, 2024.

Home baked goodies are always a favorite, We need folks willing to bake cookies, brownies, any treat that will travel well. There will be a sign up sheet in the gathering area or let me know. Again to help with planning.

Packing of boxes: TBD, it will be either Sunday Feb 4, 2024, in the afternoon or Monday, Feb. 5, 2024, in the evening. Delivering boxes to Post Office for shipping: Tuesday, Feb. 6, 2024, meet at church at 9 AM.
