It's funny how we default to scarcity mode when finances tighten. We need to practice what we preach. In my nine years at Prince of Peace our Stewardship campaign has always emphasized God's abundance. Stewardship is NOT about fund raising. Stewardship is NOT about next year's budget. Stewardship IS about our response to a grace-filled God.

Now, because society entangles finances with identity, it is impossible not to have a Stewardship discussion without talking about money. Yes, on Sunday November 20th, we will be asking, as we do every year, for your 2023 pledge. I ask you to be generous in your response to the life and mission of Prince of Peace. But base your intent on joy and not duty. Get caught up in the abundance of God, and not on the fear of not having enough.

We all know financial news is not good. Inflation is up. Stocks are down. At church the pandemic has accelerated a decline that was set in motion long before March 2020. If I am honest, there is very good reason to be afraid. But why do we ditch God's promises so quickly? Have not God's people faced challenges before?

I will be the first to acknowledge that churches will not financially sustain the model that has served them so well in the past. We are used to every church having a building, a full-time pastor, and at least a small staff. But that model will look different in the not-so-distant future. But this is nothing to be afraid of. It really is exciting. When the church's first question is, 'how do we share the gospel?' as opposed to 'how do we maintain the building?' that is exciting. When our giving is caught up in what God is doing as opposed to fears about meeting the budget, that is exciting.

And here's the good news. When our giving is based on our response to a gracious God, there will be more money.

So this year let's just name it. God's Grace: Now What?



Two New Additions to the Racial Justice Library


First Nations Version IVP 2021

The FNV is a dynamic equivalence translation of the New Testament that captures the simplicity, clarity, and beauty of Native storytellers in English, while remaining faithful to the original language of the Bible. The culmination of a rigorous five-year translation process, this new Bible translation is a collaboration



between organizations like OneBook and Wycliffe Associates, Indigenous North Americans from over twenty-five different tribes, and a translation council that consisted of twelve Native North American elders, pastors, young adults, and men and women from different tribes and diverse geographic locations.

Hood Feminism Penguin 2021



In her searing collection of essays, Mikki Kendall takes aim at the legitimacy of the modern feminist movement, arguing that it has chronically failed to address the needs of all but a few women. Drawing on her own experiences with hunger, violence, and hypersexualization, along with incisive commentary on reproductive rights, politics, pop culture, the stigma of

mental health, and more, Hood Feminism delivers an irrefutable indictment of a movement in flux. An unforgettable debut, Kendall has written a ferocious clarion call to all would-be feminists to live out the true mandate of the movement in thought and in deed.



Next Meeting November 1

As the Racial Justice Team ends its focus on Indigenous Peoples with the moving of the orange banner honoring and remembering those children killed, lost, or at the very least impacted by their time in residential schools, a few items came out this past month that may be of interest to continue our education about our indigenous neighbors.

Claire Garland Talk on Lenape Culture

Prince of Peace members filled the double classroom (we added chairs twice!) and stayed after to talk to the Native American speaker who presented a forum on Indigenous Peoples weekend. Claire Garland, who is part Cherokee, part Lenni Lenape, and part Dutch Colonial brought artifacts in addition to her very informative slide presentation about the Lenape Culture, that of the tribe who inhabited the land on which we worship. Many thanks to Ms. Garland for sharing Native American history of our area with those attending.

ELCA Declaration on Indigenous Peoples

Movement to Honor Treaty and Seat Cherokee Delegate in Congress

The Cherokee Nation is trying to get us (the USA) to abide by the terms of a treaty signed in 1835, the Treaty of New Echota, which led to the expulsion of Cherokees from their homeland and forced them to move west on the Trail of Tears, where one-quarter of the Cherokee population perished. But many don't know that the Treaty of New Echota also guaranteed the Cherokee people a right to send a delegate to Congress. If you'd like to help, sign if you agree: The United States must honor its commitment to the Cherokee people. Like representatives from D.C., Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the Northern Mariana Islands, the Cherokee delegate would not be able to vote on the House floor but would have the power to make speeches and vote in committee. This representation matters, not only because it is a binding obligation made by the United States government, but because the Cherokee Nation is the largest tribe in the U.S., with more than 430,000 citizens. But two centuries later, the U.S. still has not seated a Cherokee delegate. Please make your voice heard.

Racial Justice Library

We'd like to remind everyone that it's easier than ever to take out a book or two to read or share with your family and friends from our Racial Justice Free Lending Library. The books are on the tall shelf in the lounge area near the coat rack outside the sanctuary. Read about several new books, including a Native American translation of the New Testament, which have been added this month and browse next time you're in church. You'll be surprised what a variety of cultures and genres are available for reading at your leisure. Sign out a book or two and keep them as long as you need to. And we'd love to have you write some comments on the included bookmark for others to read. See page 2 for two new additions to the library.

There are cultural and ethnic holidays, and observances which occur around the world to mark these events. They have been either brought to this

country by immigrants or have significance to them, even if not celebrated here. Many other Americans are oftentimes unaware of their observance.

Also, not to be overlooked are the traditional festivals of the First Nations.

Several of these are listed below.

| 11/1- | Native American Heritage | Native American/ | Celebrates the culture and heritage of native |
| 30 | <u>Month</u> | USA | people who enrich this country. |
| 11/1- 2 | Dia de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) | Mexico | This is a Christian holiday commemorating all people who have passed. It is often celebrated in the Mexican and Aztec communities. |
| 11/3 | Culture Day | Japan | Otherwise known as <i>Bunka no hi</i> , is a day to honor traditional Japanese culture and promote the love of freedom and peace that was enshrined in the Japanese constitution. |
| 11/8 | Guru Nanak Jayanti | India | This is one of the most sacred festivals in Sikhism, or Sikhi. The festivities in the Sikh religion revolve around the anniversaries of the 10 Sikh Gurus responsible for shaping the beliefs of the Sikhs. |
| 11/19 | Feast of Nuestra Señora de la Divina Providencia | Puerto Rico | The devotion was brought to Puerto Rico in the early 1850s by the Servite Fathers. Our Lady of Providence was declared the patroness of Puerto Rico on November 19, 1969. Her feast day is celebrated in many Puerto Rican communities. |
| 11/20 | Transgender Day of Remembrance | USA | A day to memorialize those who have been murdered as a result of transphobia. The day was founded to draw attention to the continued violence endured by transgender people. |
| 11/23 | Labor Thanksgiving Day | Japan | Labor Thanksgiving Day is a modern name for the ritual of Harvest Festival (<i>Niinamesai</i>). In the ritual, the Emperor makes the season's first offering of freshly harvested rice to the gods and then eats the rice himself. |
| 11/27 | Umoja Karamu Celebration | African-American | Created in 1971 by Edward Simms Jr. to inject new meaning and solidarity into the Black family through ceremony and symbol. Umoja Karamu means "unity feast" in Swahili, and is based around five colors and their meanings, which represent five historical periods in African-American history. |
