Good Friday A Service of Tenebrae



Tenebrae (Latin for "darkness") was the name given to the medieval predawn prayer celebrated by monks during the last three days in Holy Week. The order for this evening incorporates the essential elements of contrast between light and darkness integral to the tenebrae tradition within the meditation of the Seven Last Words of Christ and the singing of Lenten hymns. During this liturgy, we offer honor and reverence to the One, who having been lifted up and glorified on a cross, drew all people to himself.

Good Friday worship is incorporated into one liturgy beginning with Maundy Thursday and concluding with the Easter Vigil. This is why there is no invocation tonight, no creed, no communion, and no benediction.

As you depart from the worship room, you may place your offerings in the plates placed next to the baptismal font.

Good Friday Bidding Prayer

- P Jesus, when we get angry and wish to retaliate against our enemies:
- C Bring to our remembrance your words to your enemies from the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we feel rejected or persecuted for doing what is right and good:
- C Sustain us by the knowledge of how you were reviled and rejected on the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we suffer pain of body or anguish of mind in this life:
- C Keep us near the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we are afraid to stand for that which is true and honorable:
- C Strengthen us with the courage with which you went to the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we feel alone in the world, forsaken and forgotten:
- C Comfort us with your love made know on the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we come to the time of our own death:
- C Uphold us with the assurance that life did not end for you on the Cross.
- P Jesus, when we are tempted by despair or fear of what lies ahead:
- C Fill us with the hope of resurrection and new life which are the fruits of your Cross. Amen.
